- Alto flute (lower-pitched than the piccolo)
- C flute (the standard flute)
- Bass flute (lowest-pitched)



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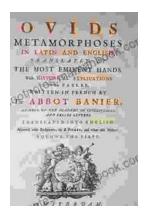
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
